

From the Executive Director Joan Mooney



Dear Members,

Another year past, another year looking forward. Since we are beginning a new year, I felt this would be a good time for reflection and renewal, and a good time to update you on several projects I'm focused on.

Much of my time in 2019 will be working on three very important preservation projects.

- 1) The Hofmann Apiaries Restoration Project
- 2) The Bailey-Lewer Research Center Porch and Ramp Repair
- 3) City of Waseca Downtown Historic District

First, I am happy to report that WCHS received the large Legacy grant we applied for to repair the roof and windows of the **Hofmann Apiaries Honey House and Wax Shed** which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Construction will begin this spring. The second project for repairs to the **Bailey-Lewer Research Center** porch and ramp has been funded by a generous donation from Henry and Phyllis Lewer, and also from Mary Allen in honor of her husband and my teacher, Phil Allen. This property is also listed on the National Register of Historic Places. And third the Heritage Preservation Commission on which I serve, has in motion a nomination for the **Waseca Downtown Commercial area to become a National Register Historic District**.

You may ask why we spend so much time on these projects. And yes, working through all the red tape and the complications that come with grant writing, construction time lines, local, state and federal codes and standards especially with properties listed on the National Register, can be very stressful, indeed. When grant money is received from the State of Minnesota, the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and Grant Office make sure that the standards are met and that the money is spent for what each grant specifies.

I have had to hone my grant writing skills and learn how to most efficiently coordinate the calendars and needs of our architects, contractors and everyone else working on each project. And of course, each project comes with its own unique set of challenges and setbacks. So, it is not all "fun and games". You may wonder if its worth all of the time, effort and money spent on these properties. To this I must say, National Register Standards are put in place on a federal level by the National Park Service, because these properties are, by their standards "national treasures". Following these federal standards insures that the properties are 1) preserved by implementing the best practices and materials for the preservation of the structure; 2) that the structures are protected from damage due to the use of incompatible materials and applications. A shining example of preservation done right is the recently completed Waseca County Courthouse masonry and window restoration.

Special thanks need to be given to Jan and Larry Hofmann for partnering with WCHS on the next leg of this adventure for Hofmann Apiaries; to Mary Allen and family and to Henry and Phyllis Lewer for their caretaking the family home, now the Bailey-Lewer Research Center; and to the Waseca County Commissioners and citizens for supporting the Courthouse repairs.

Thanks also to the Ron Johnson Family Foundation and to Caryn Wendt for providing funding for a second digital microfilm reader for the Bailey Lewer Research Center.

Preserving history is expensive and difficult. Your support encourages us to forge on with our stated mission: to collect, preserve, interpret and disseminate the history of our county and citizens, and to create excitement and interest in our past. To this I say Thank you!




From the WCHS Museum Director

Father Patrick McCabe

St. Mary Cemetery, in Section 33 of St. Mary Township, Waseca County has long been the home to a rather famous Roman Catholic priest by the name of Fr. Patrick McCabe (1822-1899).

Our files in the Bailey Lewer Research Center contain several articles written about Fr. McCabe. He was born in County Cavan, Ireland on October 25, 1822. Father Patrick was ordained in March 1859 by the Rt. Rev. Mon. H. C. Whelan for the diocese of Perth, W. A., arriving there on August 8.

In 1868, we find him as a priest for almost nine years in the Diocese of Perth, Australia, which covered nearly a million square miles. That same year, a British ship brought sixty Irish political prisoners there to be incarcerated in the Fremantle prison. Among these prisoners was John Boyle O'Reilly. John was a former member of the British Army who had been court-martialed in England and sentenced to death for his part in the 1867

Fenian revolt, but his sentence had been changed to 20 years penal servitude. After spending about a year in English prisons, O'Reilly and others were shipped to Fremantle, Australia. The journey took three months, during which time O'Reilly and his literary-minded companions produced *The Wild Goose*, a manuscript journal seven issues long. John Flood was the editor, O'Reilly the assistant editor.

Once in Australia, O'Reilly was befriended by a Fr. Lynch and told him that his goal in life was to escape Australia and go to America to help the plight of the Famine Irish there. Fr. Lynch believed him and promised to talk to Fr. McCabe to enlist his help in the escape. O'Reilly was eventually assigned to a work party in the Bunbury district about 120 miles southwest of Perth. Fr. McCabe was rebuilding the little church in Bunbury at the time, among his numerous other priestly duties. One day he sent a trusted friend, James Maguire, with a personally written note to O'Reilly. Maguire helped get O'Reilly on Captain Gifford's American whaling boat, the *Gazelle*, in February 1869. About the end of November the same O'Reilly arrived in the United States to eventually become editor and part proprietor of the *Boston Pilot*, a prominent Irish Catholic newspaper. In 1876, the Catalpa Expedition secured the release of his fellow political prisoners still there, accounts of which are in many libraries.


It was just a matter of time before it became known to the authorities that Fr. McCabe had helped O'Reilly in his escape. Fr. McCabe left Northhampton on horseback for Albany, a distance of 600 miles. Wild dogs attacked his horse along the way, causing him to fall and break a wrist. In early May he sailed from Albany to Adelaide, South Australia, where he had charge of a parish for a

few years.



Fr. McCabe made contact with his friend, John Boyle O'Reilly in Boston when he arrived in the United States. He met him again when O'Reilly was giving a lecture in St. Paul, Minnesota in March 1890. He stayed as O'Reilly's guest two days in St. Paul and the reunion was joyful for both, according to Roche's life story of O'Reilly (1891). O'Reilly died six months later. While Roche was preparing the biography of O'Reilly, he was hearing that O'Reilly had broken his parole by escaping from Australia. He wrote to Fr. McCabe and Captain Hathaway (who had been the Third Mate aboard the *Gazelle*) and received the following from Fr. McCabe (Hathaway's testimony was equally emphatic), "John Boyle O'Reilly never broke his parole, never having one to break...Silence the vile wretch that dares to slander the name of our dear departed friend and you will have my blessing."

In 1882, Fr. McCabe was appointed by Bishop Ireland of the St. Paul, Minnesota Diocese as pastor of St. Mary's Church, near Waseca. On the Sunday before Christmas, December 20, 1885, the five year old church building was destroyed by fire.



The account that Anne E. Hoehn brought to WCHS states that "...Fr. McCabe had celebrated Mass in the morning with no signs of trouble. Very little of the contents was saved. A beautiful statue of St. Joseph, which has been presented to the church two months previous by Peter Burns and Christie Hefferan, and the statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary were removed from the burning building. Thomas Geraghty and James Byron were instrumental in saving the chalices and some of the alter furniture. Many of the parishioners gathered and stood helplessly by with tear-rimmed eyes and broken hearts, as they watched the endless hours of labor turn to ashes... Fr. McCabe was moved to Mapleton...returned (in 1890) and remained pastor until his death in 1899." He died on October 21, 1899 and today his tombstone can easily be recognized in the St. Mary's Cemetery across the field from the old church site.

From the Archives of Catholic Archdiocese of Perth -

There has been at least one pilgrimage made to Fr. McCabe's final resting place. Fr. Moynihan was visiting the United States and wrote an article for the *Boston Pilot* on the journey. On Pentecost Sunday in 1966 two young Irish doctors (research fellows at the Mayo Clinic) Dr. Michael B. O'Sullivan, Dr. Paul O'Donovan, their wives and children, and Fr. Moynihan (Diocesan Archivist, Western Australia) set out from Rochester, Minnesota for Waseca. They visited St. Mary church and noticed there a window dedicated to Fr. McCabe's memory. They went the short distance across the road to the cemetery and had no difficulty finding the grave - a beautiful Celtic Cross for a marker. As the pilgrimage party was leaving, a car drove up. It was a Waseca County

resident who, by chance, remembered Fr. McCabe when he was the St. Mary parish priest. Fr. Moynihan stated in his article that this "was a happy ending to our little pilgrimage." The Waseca County resident who happened to be visiting St. Mary cemetery on the eve of Memorial Day was Mr. William E. Byron along with his wife and two daughters.


Special Event: Saturday May 18, 2019 at WCHS and St. Mary Cemetery

George McLaughlin and members from the Fenian Memorial Committee of America will be unveiling the memorial stone on Saturday, May 18, 2019. A benediction, commemoration and celebration of this great man will follow.




