

Hofmann Apiaries Update

WCHS, Larry and Jan Hofmann, Thomas Zahn and Associates, Bluestem Heritage Group, SMSQ Architects, Minnesota Cultural Heritage Fund, the Waseca Area Foundation and individual donors have assisted over the past 8 years to bring us to where we are today...on the doorstep of the "big ask"! We have submitted the pre-application to the State Historic Preservation grants office for the funding of the exterior restoration of the Honey House and Wax Shed. The final application will be submitted in July.

The journey has been an enriching educational experience. This has never been done before anywhere. I wish I could say that other avenues for funding are available, but I have not been able to tap those resources. Our hopes are that the merits of the project, the incredible story of Hofmann Apiaries will carry us forward in our quest to save these structures.

Saving The Pink Schoolhouse by Judy Joecks

Wilton Township rural school District #20 originally began in Section 8 when John and Mary Kinney sold property to District #20 on April 29, 1864 for the first school. It was filed April 14, 1866. The 1866 teacher was Lovina Philbrook. In 1899 this old original District #20 school building was sold to Silver Lake Creamery Association. It also served for many years as the Wilton Town Hall until Wilton School District #18 closed. Then the town hall moved to the District #18 location. The old original District #20 building has been located and is still standing, but you will have to

read A Bit of "The Pink Schoolhouse" History book in order to learn more!

On August 23, 1881, School District #20 purchased the current property in Section 17. This was filed May

31, 1882. A new school building was built in Section 17, or a building was moved in. (It appears that this building was built new on this location). So, only the district moved, not the building! The 1896 Waseca County Standard Atlas shows both buildings (Section 8 and Section 17).

Why save The Pink Schoolhouse?

On November 16, 1950, District #20 voted to consolidate to


Waldorf, officially moving in the fall of 1951. August 22, 1951 the District #20 school building and property in Section 17 were sold to Henry C. Bauman to be made into a home. Lois (Bauman) Yess, her husband Lawrence, and their son Larry lived in the school building while they moved a larger house onto the property and prepared it for their home. Lois had promised her dad that the schoolhouse would always be a landmark for everyone, so she painted it pink to make sure everyone saw it.

DeeAnn Britton (Mrs. David), who lives nearby with her husband, took care of Lois for the last couple years of her life. She made a promise to Lois that she wouldn't let it be torn down, so after she passed away, DeeAnn bought the land, building and belongings. The belongings have been offered in a number of sales, with all of these proceeds going into a special account for refurbishing the school.

This is where Judy Joecks began putting together A Bit of "The Pink Schoolhouse" History book with the purpose of honoring and preserving the

history and life of "The Pink Schoolhouse" and to also help her friend, DeeAnn, raise more funds for this project.

It started out with the idea of 20 pages or so but has grown to 112 pages. It includes District #20 history, photos and information for many of the teachers, comments from many of the students or their families, and much more! The last 17 pages include photos of most of the

94 Waseca County rural schools with their locations (compliments of Waseca County Historical Museum). More information has been added to most of these photos, such as when they closed, what happened to the building, and a number of those that have been found still standing

today.

A new roof has been put on the school, the foundation will be fixed, and the remainder of the "It has been a very fun and interesting project and I love preserving this history."

CHAUTAUQUA AT TROWBRIDGE PARK

Attention to our history enriches our community. Ira Trowbridge was the founding father of Waseca. His daughters built the bandshell in 1915 as a memorial to him. The shelter was used by community bands from around the region. New Richland, Waldorf and Janesville traveled to Trowbridge Park to play. This was reciprocated by a visit to their communities by the Waseca Band. It's "what you did" in the summer time. By bringing music back to Trowbridge Park we will provide a place to gather with neighbors, family and friends.

Hon. I.C.Trowbridge has commenced work on his new mansion, which, when completed, will undoubtedly be as fine as any in the city." Unfortunately, Mr. Trowbridge did not live to occupy the new home as he died of

sudden heart failure on October 3, 1893. His widow Judith lived in the house until her death in 1906.


Son Edgar C. Trowbridge and wife Belle lived with Judith in the house. Fulfilling their father's wish, in 1915 the daughters Ella and Augusta designated the property now known as Trowbridge Park. The bandshell was erected in memory of their father. The first band concert was held in the street as the band shell was not quite finished. A gathering of over 3000 citizens came to witness the celebration. Some time between 1919 and 1930 the Trowbridge house was turned from facing the courthouse to facing the park. Anyone know the year?


